Selects the correct numeral to represent 1 to 5, then 1 to 10 objects. •Counts an irregular arrangement of up to ten objects. •Estimates how many objects they can see and checks by counting them. •Uses the language of ‘more’ and ‘fewer’ to compare two sets of objects. •Records, using marks that they can interpret and explain. •Begins to identify own mathematical problems based on own interests and fascinations. <p>Early Learning Goal Children count reliably with numbers from one to 20 place them in order say which number is one more or one less than a given number</p>

Multiplication and division		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Separates a group of three or four objects in different ways, beginning to recognise that the total is still the same. 	<p>ELG They solve problems, including doubling, halving and sharing.</p>

Measurement	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Notices simple shapes and patterns in pictures. • Beginning to categorise objects according to properties such as size. • Begins to use the language of size. • Understands some talk about immediate past and future, e.g. 'before', 'later' or 'soon'. • Anticipates specific time-based events such as mealtimes or home time. 		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Orders two or three items by length or height. • Orders two items by weight or capacity. • Uses everyday language related to time. • Beginning to use everyday language related to money. • Orders and sequences familiar events. • Measures short periods of time in simple ways. <p>Early Learning Goal Children use everyday language to talk about size, weight, capacity, position, distance, time and money to compare quantities and objects and to solve problems.</p>
